is a great listener, he encourages positive social behaviours, can enhance selfesteem and inspire pupils to relax and have fun!







All Saints – Your Parish Church – A Reflection by Reverend Al Jenkins

Hello everyone, it is really a privilege to offer a short reflection in this edition of Signpost. It is now 10 months since I arrived here at All Saints to take up my post as the parish priest. It has been a very busy time, but the most striking thing is the welcome that both Jayne and I have received from so many in the village.



The church building has been part of the landscape here for hundreds of years, as many village churches are, and it holds a special place in so many peoples hearts. We have taken the decision to keep the church open every weekday (Monday to Friday) to give people an opportunity to visit, to pray or explore this wonderful place of worship. This has been very well received and we are so grateful to receive so many messages of support. We have also seen the gradual opening of the church for worship as the effects of the pandemic has lessened, but we are conscious that it has not gone away. We have celebrated the joy of church weddings, the baptism of so many children and recently the baptism of adult candidates too. Worship is now held regularly in church, and we hope to provide new services in the months to come including Junior Church, Youth Church and All Age Worship. We will let you know when they are ready to go. What ever worship you might wish to attend you will always receive a warm welcome.

There are challenges ahead for the church as we move into a world which has so many issues. As Christians we believe in a Creator God, a God who gave us this world to look after and protect. Part of our reaction to that, in partnership with the Parish Council and Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust, is to try to create a wildflower meadow in the churchyard. I am aware that this has caused some concern amongst some but as we see more and more greenspaces given over to construction, safe havens and corridors for insects and birds is ever more important. I hope that you will be able to support us in our aims and allow nature time to do its wonderful work.

The Parochial Church Council is working hard to keep the fabric of the church in good condition. There continues to be areas where we need support, and you would be welcome to come and talk to us about any gifts that you might have which would help with that. The cost of this work continues to be funded by some very committed people and our thanks go to all of you who help us with this.

It has been a privilege to get to know so many in such a short time and I hope that over the coming months and years that I will have the opportunity to meet more of you, to work with you, worship with you. With every blessing. Al.



" Winchelsea the charity edition!!

We are so excited to be getting back to some more normality and returning to lots of the activities that Winchelsea is well-known for – exciting learning opportunities, superb links with our local community and beyond, fund raising to support both our school and various charities and developing our school to make it better and better for all of our pupils, staff and parents. It has been great to see the smiles on the faces of the children as well as the visitors and community groups we have begun to resume our fantastic relationships with.

I thought this time I would share some of the great charity and fund-raising activities that have been going on in school since my last magazine article. We think it is important that we support others who may not be as fortunate as ourselves and this is an integral part of our school values, aims and ethos.

Mental Health Week

Winchelsea took part in Children's Mental Health Week. This was a great opportunity for us to explore activities that focussed on how children can look after themselves and the ways that they can manage their emotions or support others together. The week started with a special assembly in which I shared a story with the children about how my grandmother encouraged me as a child to think about my day before I went to sleep at night. She did this by putting a teaspoon in my bed which would remind me to think of TSP – thank you, sorry and please. By doing this we can put to rest any problems or difficulties we have had during the day, focus on some positives



and think about what we might do tomorrow to make our day go well. Following this assembly, teachers returned to this every day with the children and maybe this has become something the children can use at home to discuss their days with their families. As well as lots of lesson activities, the children and staff took part in two special days. Wednesday of that week was 'Inside Out Day'. Inside Out's motto is 'How someone looks on the outside doesn't necessarily reflect how they are truly feeling on the inside, so it is important to always be kind and think of others.' To support this the children simply needed to wear one item of their school uniform



inside out – this could be as discreet as a sock or as obvious as a school jumper. The second day was 'Dress to Express Day'. Children were asked to make a small donation for the charity Place2Be who support children and families as well as provide training and information to help schools. Pupils and staff could wear their favourite colour or a unique outfit as an opportunity for self-expression and celebrating a diverse range of emotions. We raised over £140 for this worthy cause.



World Book Day

Everyone had great fun on World Book Day. The children were greeted at the school gate at the beginning of the day by the Queen of Hearts on the playground before entering their classrooms where their teachers and support staff met them dressed as various characters such as Red Riding Hood, the Polar Bear who saved Christmas, the Green Crayon from 'The day the crayons quit' and even the wardrobe from 'The Lion, the Witch and The Wardrobe'. We then had a whole school assembly where we enjoyed talking about each other's costumes and quessing which book



was represented. The children each brought to school their favourite book too so that they could share them and introduce each other to books they may not know about to expand their knowledge. All of the classroom activities focussed on particular books – some of them were the featured books that could be purchased this year for free with the book tokens they received at the end of the day – and some focussed on class texts. The oldest children looked at how books have been adapted for film such as Jungle Book and the Wizard of Oz. They also looked at Harry Potter and designed their own magical beasts which they had to write a description of and have also created some art work of. Some of the younger children watched a showcase of authors talking about how they write their books and wrote their own stories and poems which they performed at the end of the day. We even had a special school dinner with a World Book Day bake with Gansta Granny green beans and Billionaire Boy shortbread! We hope the children will go on to investigate more books that they have learnt about and have used their free book token to buy new books to enjoy.

Comic Relief Day

As usual, Winchelsea took part in Comic Relief/Red Nose Day to raise money for all the good causes it supports. The children and staff were invited to dress up as a hero of some kind. This could be a superhero or an everyday hero that they look up to. During the day the children took part in fun-related activities in their classrooms. In return for wearing their superhero outfits we asked for a donation of at least £1 although children and parents could give more if they chose to. We raised a brilliant £216.37 for this great cause.







Donations for Ukraine

We were extremely grateful to all those who sent in donations for our support for those affected by the troubles in Ukraine. We received an amazing number of items ranging from nappies and wet wipes, milk formula and baby food to children's toys, colouring books and sweets. Once again, the generosity and thoughtfulness of the Winchelsea community could be seen in action.

We are looking forward to welcoming two Ukrainian families and their children to our school. I know our pupils and staff will support them and enjoy learning all about them. This is a great opportunity to learn about another culture and country and we are excited to broaden our understanding and begin to be able to use another language!

Local Defibrillators



Ruskington has public access defibrillators at the following locations:

- * The Winchelsea Centre, 11 High Street
 North, NG34 9DY
- * The Co-op, High Street North, NG34 9DY
- * The Village Hall , Parkfield Road, NG34 9HT
- Ruskington Medical Centre, 6 Brookside
 Close, NG34 9GQ

These are free to use by the members of the public. Upon calling the emergency services, they will be able to instruct you on where to go and how to access the defibrillator, if needed. But its always good to have a mental note of where the nearest one is located.

If there is any concerns in relation to the defibrillators, please contact the Clerk to the Parish Council on 01526 834483.

Hospital Voluntary Car Service (HVCS)

The service provides a reliable door-to-door journey and is available to all residents of Ruskington and Dorrington who have no other viable or practical means of attending a medical or dental appointment.

It is available for journeys to locations within the county although this can be extended to Nottinghamshire, Cambridgeshire and Derbyshire if required. It is charged at 45p per mile (Measured from the centre of Ruskington.)

If you have a car and a few hours to spare why not become a volunteer driver. You are paid 45p per mile – tax free!

Note: The HVCS has been approved to operate during the current COVID pandemic with some restrictions on number of patients carried.
