



# Subscriptions open for North Kesteven Garden Waste collections

Fortnightly over ten months, and continuing four-weekly through December and January, the paid-for North Kesteven District Council service represents cost-effective convenience for those households unable or not wishing to compost at home.

The charge for a full year's service from March 28, 2022 will be £40 for a single or first bin, an increase of £5 on last year to meet the increased costs of running this concessionary service, including a 20% increase in fuel. The emptying of additional bins is reduced to £8 each.

"This is the first increase in two years and does, we believe, continue to represent excellent value for money of 77p per week, or around £1.60 for each of the 24 or 25 collection opportunities throughout the year," said Cllr Mervyn Head, Executive Board Member with special interest for waste and environmental services.

"With the convenience of being able to put out for collection all your grass clippings, weeds, swept-up leaves and other garden waste on a regular basis – rather than load it up to take to a household waste recycling centre or arrange and pay for a licenced waste carrier to take it for you – our annual brown bin service remains a popular and cost-effective choice."

"It is a charge that only those people wishing to use the service by opting in, need to pay, rather than being a universal cost on all households regardless of their call on it. We hope that it provides a cheaper, easier and more climate-conscious method of disposing of organic garden waste than individuals transporting it themselves."

Brown bins can be used for grass cuttings, flowers and plants, hedge trimmings, twigs and branches, leaves and bark and for chopped up Christmas trees. Such material cannot be placed into any other bin for collection and no additional material left alongside bins will be taken.

Collection of a first or single bin will be £40 for the year, with additional bins now charged at £8 each (up to a maximum of four bins) which is a 50% cost reduction. Where a bin needs to be paid for to participate in, or expand use of, the service, these will be charged at £35 each.

The annual subscription runs to March 31, 2023.

New subscriptions to the service and renewals can be made online at <a href="www.n-keseven.gov.uk/gardenwaste">www.n-keseven.gov.uk/gardenwaste</a> from February 1 and by phone from March 1.

Early renewals are encouraged to ensure seamless continuation of service.

# **Ruskington's War**

I have many stories of the war years in Ruskington as my friend and I have lives here for 86 years and I have seen how bad the war was.

We lived in fear as we had to keep all our windows blacked out, there was no street lighting, and food and clothes were very scarce on coupons.

When the siren went to lets us know the Germans were attacking, we had to dive into our air-raid shelter. This was mostly at night and was very scary.

My Dad was a signalman at the Ruskington station. The signalbox had blacked out windows. I know he was scared, but he had to go to work. His name was C.J. Kew. The station boss was called Mr. Hill.

There was a YMCA where the bungalows off Rectory Road now stand. My friend Ina and I, aged about 10 years old, used to go to do some lovely dances and enjoyed many a good night in the youth club which was run by Mr Abbott of Ruskington.

The shop which is now OneStop, was once a lovely Church Hall with steps leading up to it. We put many concerts on in there. We even had some soldiers living in there during the war, and they used to get their food from the Methodist Chapel. All empty buildings were used to house soldiers.

There were lorries and jeeps all over the village, but only one or two cars, as only the very rich owned cars in those days—mostly big farmers from this area.

We got used to having soldiers all over the village, as they were all very kind to us.

I remember how our families were all very upset when they knew of their friends and family members having to leave for Arnham. The soldiers had a big parade in High Street North the day before they left. Everyone was upset. When they returned from Arnham, there were so many missing.

I lived in the thatched cottage which stood on the site of the Coffee Pot and part of he Co-Op for about 12 years. The yard was always busy with soldiers, tanks, jeeps and lorries all day and often at night.

We later got one for the council houses on Tennyson Road, our thatched cottage was pulled down and later the Co-Op was built.

My friend and I can remember many changes which have taken place in Ruskington during our lifetime here. We are still best friends who live near each other and we are both now aged 86 years old.



# Fix My Street. Scott Johnstone

Tired of potholes, fly-tipping, loose paving, dog poop, vandalism and broken street lighting?



You can report them to the relevant council with www.FixMyStreet.com.

The website was launched in 2007 by the UK charity mySociety.

The great thing is, you do not need to know who is responsible for fixing your problem. As it covers all of the United Kingdom, you just put a pin on a map, and FixMyStreet sends your report to the right council.




Reported problems are published on the FixMyStreet website, so you can browse your local area and see what the prevalent issues are — and what has been fixed. You can also upload a photo, using the mobile app on your phone, with your report to help show what the problem is.

Once you have sent your report, it goes straight to the council, who will get back in touch with you directly.

I have personally used the website several times to report issues on my street and also on behalf of Ruskington residents. I find it to be quick and very straightforward to use.

As you can see from the screenshot below, I reported a broken street light and received an update the same day that the job was in progress.

There is a street light out across from the village hall carpark entrance which has been out all year. It is one which allows light to shine not only on the entrance to the playing fields carpark but also lights the cut through a public footpath from Parkfield road.

#### Mini police activities.



Our mini police have been out and about to monitor the speed of cars near our school entrance on Rectory Road. They were able to use hand held speed monitors with the support of our local PCSOs and talk to drivers that were exceeding the speed limit about road safety awareness and the need to keep our community as safe as possible. They also talked to the PCSOs about the challenges we have regards to parking and traffic congestion around school and this may be a project for later in the term.

#### School council projects

Our school council are doing some great work in school and learning a lot about how councillors and MPs have a role in our community. The school council have visited the Guildhall in Lincoln where they learnt about the work that goes on there and found out a lot about local history by looking at some superb artefacts. They even were able to look at some of the robes worn by some of the key officials. Perhaps one of our pupils could be the future mayor one day! The school council have also been in touch with our local MP, Caroline Johnson, who has invited them to attend the Houses of Parliament later in the year which the children are very excited about!

We will be taking part in a virtual schools' gymnastics competition again this year and hoping to have some winners as we have done in the past.

#### **Gardening fun!**

In Year 2 the class have been doing lots of gardening – learning how to care for plants and what they need to grow – whilst making our school environment look lovely. Their classroom leads directly to our school allotments which they have planted with various fruit and vegetable plants which will be used for some cooking projects later in the year. They also enjoy using our dedicated environmental area which has bug hotels, bird boxes, a butterfly mound and a fantastic pond where the village ducks enjoy having a wander.



#### Sporting successes



Sport at Winchelsea continues to go from strength to strength and we continue to provide opportunities and experiences for children to encounter a range of different sports. Children of every age get the chance to take part in some great events – the photo shows a team taking part in New Age Kurling (fortunately without the ice!).



Last term our rugby team took part in a primary school tournament against other local schools and did a fantastic job, reaching the finals where they narrowly missed out on being the champions. Our children always try their hardest in all the sports fixtures they attend and I am always proud of their excellent team spirit and sporting values.

Ruskington has public access defibrillators at the following locations:

- \* The Co-op, High Street North, NG34 9DY
- \* The Village Hall , Parkfield Road, NG34 9HT
- Ruskington Medical Centre, 6 Brookside
   Close, NG34 9GQ

These are free to use by the members of the public. Upon calling the emergency services, they will be able to instruct you on where to go and how to access the defibrillator, if needed. But its always good to have a mental note of where the nearest one is located.

# **Hospital Voluntary Car Service (HVCS)**

The service provides a reliable door-to-door journey and is available to all residents of Ruskington and Dorrington who have no other viable or practical means of attending a medical or dental appointment.

It is available for journeys to locations within the county although this can be extended to Nottinghamshire, Cambridgeshire and Derbyshire if required. It is charged at 45p per mile (Measured from the centre of Ruskington.)
