Spring 2023 will be a busy time for Ruskington Parish Council (RPC). Councillors and staff are already engaged in preparing for two major events this year, the Local Government elections and King's Coronation celebrations in May.

# LOCAL GOVERNMENT ELECTIONS

'All out' Parish Council elections take place every 4 years to coincide with elections to the District Council. The last Parish Council elections took place in May 2019 and the next scheduled elections will be in May 2023. Interested in being a Parish Councillor? Read our article on page 21.

### KING'S CORONATION CELEBRATIONS



A community led Ruskington Events Team will organise a fun day at Parkfield Playing Fields on Sunday 7 May 2023 from 11am to 4pm.

Planning has commenced and the volunteer group hope, to include a dog show, football match, coronation themed fancy dress competition, a sausage slinging competition, bake-off, food stalls, ice-cream van, and to encourage all local groups and organisations to have a pitch (at no charge).

RPC will be inviting all High Street businesses to fly a Union flag (purchased and installed by RPC in the Christmas tree brackets) and to take part

in a Best Dressed (coronation themed) Window Competition. Orders for Union flag to the RFO at rfo@ruskingtonpc.org.ukor by 23 March 2023.

Residents are encouraged to arrange street parties and RPC can provide info and guidance on road closure paperwork.

As part of the Coronation year celebrations, our local schools will to be invited to design a crest for a Ruskington boundary sign that can be installed at the main highway entrances to the village.

A public consultation will be held in the coming months regarding the development of the Pavilion on Parkfield Playing Fields. All residents are invited to attend, details to be announced soon via our social media channels and parish office noticeboard.

# THE MEMORIAL TO AIRBORNE RECONNAISSANCE ALL SAINTS CHURCH RUSKINGTON

All Saints Church in Ruskington holds a unique memorial dedicated to two separate reconnaissance squadrons, the 1st Airborne Reconnaissance Squadron (1st AB Recce), a WWII unit and the Parachute Squadron Royal Armoured Corps (Para Sqn RAC), from the 1960s. Why is it there? 1st AB Recce, a squadron of around 250 men was formed in 1941 led by the renowned Freddie Gough and in 1943 saw action in North Africa and then up through Italy. It came to Ruskington, close to several airfields to rearm and prepare for whatever came next. Its equipment was mainly American Willys



jeeps. The majority of the men were parachute trained and were part of the wartime Airborne Forces. There were frequent preparations for operations which were always cancelled, leading to a certain amount of frustration. The soldiers themselves settled in to village life and the squadron became an integral part of the village. Many had local girlfriends and six were locals themselves. As part of the village they frequented the local pubs and dances at the YMCA. Militarily they were getting frustrated and ready for action.

On Sunday the 17th of September 1944 at 0500 hours their call to action came. They left the village in a convoy of trucks and boarded American aircraft at Barkston Heath, with the glider party transporting the Sqn's jeeps taking off in Horsa gliders from Tarrant Rushton in Dorset. They fully expected cancellation like so of-



ten before, but it wasn't to be and they took off for the fateful battle of Arnhem. Their mission was to hold the bridge at Arnhem for around 24 hours but their battle lasted nine long days and nights and they took heavy casualties. On the 25th of September they were ordered to withdraw over the river and meet approaching land forces. Of the 199 of them who had left Ruskington to parachute into Holland only 80 escaped over the river Rhine, the rest were ei-

ther dead, wounded or captured. On the 29th of September what remained of the Squadron arrived back at Ruskington. Ten trucks had taken them to Barkston and only two were required to bring the survivors back. It was 11pm but they leapt out of the trucks and went straight to the Shoulder of Mutton pub where the landlord opened up for them. Despite the late hour, the villagers turned out to hear their story. This is commemorated in the Shoulder of Mutton by a montage of photographs. The Squadron was disbanded shortly after the end of the war. In 1947, the survivors paid for and built a memorial to those lost in action. It took only a fortnight to install, using local stone and artisans. A feat in itself.



In 1964 a new airborne reconnaissance squadron, The Para Sqn RAC was formed. It drew volunteers from all cavalry and tank regiments and was based in Tidworth Hampshire. It supported 16 Parachute Brigade as their anti tank and Recce force. The Sqn had a mixture of Humber Hornets which fired the Malkara anti tank missile, Ferret Scout cars and later Ferrets with the new Swingfire missile. Members of the Sqn also had to be proficient infantry sol-

diers and had to train in everything from jungle to desert. It served in such diverse places as: Bahrain, Aden, Libya, Northern Ireland, Malaya, Kenya and Malta. It completed 9 active service tours and sadly lost two soldiers. The Sqn motto was "Go Anywhere, Do Anything, Willingly" and the demands placed upon the Sqn meant that they were never doing nothing.

Like 1st AB Recce before them, the RAC Sqn formed a strong bond between all ranks. This was largely due to the need to pass The Pre Parachute selection via the infamous (P Company) and in part because everyone was a volunteer. In 1967 a small group of the Sqn were tasked to attend the 1st AB Recce Old Comrades Association (OCA) meeting to demonstrate the modern equipment to the "Arnhem boys". This was the start of a close and enduring relationship and in 1977 the insignia of the 1st AB Recce was added to flag of the Para Sqn RAC and laid up with prayer in All Saints Church. In 2018 it was decided to update the memorial and prepare for receipt of the Standard of 1st AB Recce on the death of the final Arnhem veteran (three left at present). The work was completed in 2022 and a service of rededication will be held in All Saints Church.

# **SLEAFORD RURAL Neighbourhood Policing**



A Message on PCSO Numbers from NPT Sgt Mumby-Croft: You may have seen media coverage of the news that Lincolnshire may have to almost half its numbers of PCSO's. There is no doubt that policing in your local communities would be impacted. Despite debate about the worth of the role I can only offer you my personal view, which is that the presence of PCSO's has saved what remains of community policing. For many of you they are all that remains of visible policing of "the beat" as diminishing numbers of response officers deal with inbound emergency calls for service. They visit our most vulnerable victims of fraud, patrol areas suffering ASB, run our community engagements, provide the intelligence which informs our ability to tackle drugs and criminality, and are a vast resource of knowledge on every offender and issue locally. It is impossible in their absence that our service to you at Neighbourhood level will not be impacted. We run a small but dedicated team here at Sleaford trying to keep the local community safe. That effort will not be lessened. I ask those however who might pose the question "well what do they do?" to instead consider what will lost. A visible presence when many fear that is becoming rare, a wealth of local knowledge, total commitment to their community and a vital resource which props up policing in your local area will be the loss. Please if you see our PCSO's out and about, remember that they are continuing to serve their local communities despite extremely difficult circumstances at present, and thank them for being there, because I suspect we will all miss them if they are gone.

# **Ruskington Parish Council Cemetery News**

# Cemetery Regulations

Please be aware that following a thorough review, Council approved the cemetery regulations without amendment at its meeting in October 2022. This followed advice from the Institute of Cemetery and Crematoria Management and the Lincolnshire Association of Local Councils on the placement of non-regulation items in the cemetery and their removal.

Please note that only floral tributes are allowed. These can be placed on the headstone, grave or ashes plot but not around, beside, or in front of the grave/plot, and nothing can be planted.

Council understands that this is a very emotive issue and families may like to place tributes to their loved ones in the cemetery. However, the regulations are in place to ensure the health and safety of visitors to the cemetery, contractors and council staff; to provide safe access to other graves and plots; to allow maintenance work to be undertaken; and to ensure the cemetery is a restful and pleasant place for all to visit and reflect in peace.


Annually, from the 31st January, Council removes Christmas wreaths and throughout the year will remove dead and decayed flowers and any dangerous items such as glass. Council has the right to remove any non-regulation items but does try to inform the person holding the Exclusive Grant of Burial for the plot/grave in advance, so the items can be retrieved.

Ashes Scattering Area - An area for scattering ashes is being created on the south border. There will be no cost to scatter ashes in this location, and although no memorial items may be left, residents will be able to purchase a plaque from the Council for engraving and displaying. Further information on this will follow.

Memorial Headstones - With immediate effect, only flat or sloping "tablet" headstones will be permitted on ashes plots to complement the size of the plots. These tablets can be created to incorporate flower vases, and your chosen stone mason will be able to advise you on this.

With local council elections taking place on 4th May 2023, have you thought about becoming a councillor on Ruskington Parish Council?

Why become a councillor? Being a parish councillor is all about giving back to your community by bringing your energy, passion, and hard-working attitude. You can make a real difference to the local community and wider society in many ways as a councillor. For example, you could be representing the views of local people to ensure the community gets the right services, supporting a resident with an issue, or helping to shape the community by driving new ideas.

Being a parish councillor is a varied and highly fulfilling role. You don't need any experience or special qualifications, and you'll gain lots of new skills, experience, knowledge, and confidence.

What do councillors do? Parish councils are made up of councillors who are or co-opted or elected by the public in local elections. Councillors work with local people and partners, such as community groups, businesses and other organisations, to agree and deliver on local priorities. The decisions are implemented by permanent parish council officers and staff, who deliver services on a daily basis.

Who can be a councillor? To stand for election/co-option on a parish council, you must:

- British or a citizen of the Commonwealth. You may also be eligible as a citizen of the European Union, however the criteria has changed now that the UK has left the European Union. Please check on the gov.uk website for advice about EU citizens' voting and candidacy rights in local elections.
- At least 18 years old.
- Registered to vote in the area or have lived, worked, or owned property there for at least 12 months before an election.

Do I need any skills, experience or special qualifications? No skills or qualifications are required to be a councillor - just a passion to make our community the best it can be.

Will I get paid? Councillors are not paid a salary, but they are entitled to receive expenses. This ensures they are not left out of pocket by covering costs such as travel to and from training, etc.


ready for our online invitation to the Capulet Ball, with the Royal Opera House. This is such an amazing opportunity, and we look forward to taking part.

All 230 Winchelsea pupils took to the stage over the course of a week with three different plays being performed to parents. We also had a fantastic trip to the pantomime at Newark which was enjoyed by the whole school! We are extremely grateful to all who supported our Christmas raffle – either buying tickets or providing some great prizes. We had wonderful support from local businesses and parents who donated some wonderful items ranging from vouchers to be used in our neighbourhood shops to items of confectionary or pamper products to make some beautiful hampers. As a result, we raised £457.45 which will be used in school to help subsidise the ever-growing cost of class trips which we know the children love and which we value as a part of our excellent curriculum provision. We thank our super PTA for organising the raffle and for giving up their time to talk to local businesses and to sell raffle tickets at our performances.

Once again, I thought I would share some photos that show some of the great activities that have been going on in school.



Sporting successes - Sport at Winchelsea continues to go from strength to strength and we continue to provide opportunities and experiences for children to encounter a range of different sports. Children of every age get the chance to take part in some great events – some quite unusual –and this term has included archery, athletics and rugby.

Our football team is doing fantastically well with two wins to start the year and, as well as the league fixtures, the chil-

dren are enjoying meeting other schools in friendly matches. We have a mixed team but have also recently set up a dedicated girls' football team inspired by the success of our England ladies, and we are seeing their talents and confidence blossoming.

Community partnerships - At Winchelsea we are proud of our community partnerships which are extensive and include the local churches, charities, village library, local businesses such as the Co-op and this year we are working even more closely with Sleaford Rotary club. They have already supported our families with their Coats4kids scheme, enabling children to have a warm coat for the winter and

we have also developed some great ideas for supporting and improving the village of Ruskington, Last term our gardening club went out with them to plant daffodils and crocuses along the side of the beck along the High Street and we are excited to see them starting to come through as Spring approaches. We are also planning to work with them on some litter picking expeditions and hope that everyone un the village will see and appreciate our work.





Design and Technology - We have been doing some great new projects around DT and the children are developing some excellent skills in this subject - from cutting and sticking in our Early Years to cookery and sewing textiles in Year 6. Across school I have sampled pizzas, smoothies, cakes and sandwiches in cookery lessons and been amazed by models of rockets, castles and Roman jewellery. The design and making of waistcoats by Year 6 was a test in determination and perseverance from every-

one involved – including the staff- but the results were superb!

School Council Projects - Our school council continue to do some great work in school and have been learning a lot about how councillors and MPs have a role in our community. The school council visited the Guildhall in Lincoln where they learnt about the work that goes on there and found out a lot about local history by looking at some superb artefacts. They even were able to look at some of the robes worn by some of the key officials. Perhaps one of our pupils could be the future mayor one day!

The children know how important it is that they represent their classes and gather their views and opinions to make a difference to how our school operates just as councillors and MPs should. We have some exciting plans for continuing to develop our school grounds and the children have played a



full part in providing the views of their classmates, suggesting ideas for design plans and sharing their thoughts and ideas about what they would like to see. The



children have been keen to create a quiet area that can be used as a place of calm and relaxation – what we are calling our 'Zen courtyard'. With mood lighting, wind chimes, water jets, aromatic planters, a fountain and some 'relaxation-friendly seating the design has now been passed to a specialist company and preparations are underway for the design to be put into ac-

tion – I think I might enjoy spending time there too when it's finished!

The children have also suggested that a 'fitness trail' would be a great asset to our school grounds and so we have recently had some work completed to prepare a pathway through our wooded area where we will be having some fitness equipment installed very soon which the children have selected and will enjoy using to build their stamina and skills.
