


# OF THE CHURCH YARD

pring is well underway now and the rain has given way to glorious sunshine - and in the churchyard this is reflected in the pale yellow flowers of Yellow Rattle. Rhianthus minor.

The naturalisation of the churchyard is now in its third season, and it is an ideal time to see just what the Yellow Rattle does.

Stand at the east gate and look towards the church, on your right-hand side of the path is the area in its second year of Yellow Rattle - and the left side has not had any. You will notice that the grasses on the right-hand side have reduced massively, this is because Yellow Rattle is semiparasitic to grasses, it attaches itself to the roots and steals nutrients which weakens the grasses. This allows space for the more delicate grasses and wildflowers to thrive.

The north side was sown with Yellow Rattle last autumn with seed harvested from the east side, and it is working its magic. I believe I will be able to harvest enough seed this year to sow the entire southern side in the autumn, which will speed up the entire process by a year.



Wildflower seeds were sown into the eastern side last autumn and now it is a waiting game to see what emerges. It is worth remembering that seeds can sit dormant for several years and germinate when conditions are right, so of the 24 species sown we should have a cycle of interesting plants appearing over the years. The southern side will be cut in July and the cuttings removed, this timed just before the grasses set seed, depleting their energy.

I hope you will enjoy the transformation with me. Since the end of the second world war. England has lost around 97% of its meadows, churchyards were often meadows and grazed by sheep in the autumn. This is why it is important to restore what we can and help our dwindling insect population which is the basis of all our wildlife.

**PCSO UPDATE** – As I'm sure most of you will be aware by now. Lincolnshire Police, due to a funding gap are currently making changes to the neighbourhood Policing Team. This has sadly, resulted in cutting our Police community Support Officer numbers from 91 to 50. This is an ongoing process that will unfortunately affect the number of PCSO's we will have, within Sleaford and the surrounding area.

The restructure has identified 19 vulnerable locations around the County where the PCSO's will be deployed.

Sleaford Town centre has been identified as one of those vulnerable locations and will see TWO PCSO's remain for Sleaford.

We will endeavour to keep you updated and well informed of the changes and potential impact this may have on our communities.

# **Ruskington Parish Council Cemetery News**

#### Cemetery Regulations

Please be aware that following a thorough review, Council approved the cemetery regulations without amendment at its meeting in October 2022. This followed advice from the Institute of Cemetery and Crematoria Management and the Lincolnshire Association of Local Councils on the placement of non-regulation items in the cemetery and their removal.

Please note that only floral tributes are allowed. These can be placed on the headstone, grave or ashes plot but not around, beside, or in front of the grave/plot, and nothing can be planted.

Council understands that this is a very emotive issue and families may like to place tributes to their loved ones in the cemetery. However, the regulations are in place to ensure the health and safety of visitors to the cemetery, contractors and council staff; to provide safe access to other graves and plots; to allow maintenance work to be undertaken; and to ensure the cemetery is a restful and pleasant place for all to visit and reflect in peace.

# Removal of Christmas wreaths, decayed flowers & non-regulation items

Annually, from the 31st January, Council removes Christmas wreaths and throughout the year will remove dead and decayed flowers and any dangerous items such as glass. Council has the right to remove any non-regulation items but does try to inform the person holding the Exclusive Grant of Burial for the plot/grave in advance, so the items can be retrieved.

Ashes Scattering Area - An area for scattering ashes is being created on the south border. There will be no cost to scatter ashes in this location, and although no memorial items may be left, residents will be able to purchase a plaque from the Council for engraving and displaying. Further information on this will follow.

Memorial Headstones - With immediate effect, only flat or sloping "tablet" headstones will be permitted on ashes plots to complement the size of the plots. These tablets can be created to incorporate flower vases, and your chosen stone mason will be able to advise you on this.

There are currently 6 councillor vacancies, have you thought about becoming a councillor on Ruskington Parish Council?

Why become a councillor? Being a parish councillor is all about giving back to your community by bringing your energy, passion, and hard-working attitude. You can make a real difference to the local community and wider society in many ways as a councillor. For example, you could be representing the views of local people to ensure the community gets the right services, supporting a resident with an issue, or helping to shape the community by driving new ideas.

Being a parish councillor is a varied and highly fulfilling role. You don't need any experience or special qualifications, and you'll gain lots of new skills, experience, knowledge, and confidence.

What do councillors do? Parish councils are made up of councillors who are or co-opted or elected by the public in local elections. Councillors work with local people and partners, such as community groups, businesses and other organisations, to agree and deliver on local priorities. The decisions are implemented by permanent parish council officers and staff, who deliver services on a daily basis.

Who can be a councillor? To stand for election/co-option on a parish council, you must:

- British or a citizen of the Commonwealth. You may also be eligible as a citizen of the European Union, however the criteria has changed now that the UK has left the European Union. Please check on the gov.uk website for advice about EU citizens' voting and candidacy rights in local elections.
- At least 18 years old.
- Registered to vote in the area or have lived, worked, or owned property there for at least 12 months before an election.

Do I need any skills, experience or special qualifications? No skills or qualifications are required to be a councillor - just a passion to make our community the best it can be.

Will I get paid? Councillors are not paid a salary, but they are entitled to receive expenses. This ensures they are not left out of pocket by covering costs such as travel to and from training, etc.

#### Year 2 Visit Boston









As part of our history curriculum Year 2 have been learning about significant historical events, people, and places in their own locality. They enjoyed a trip to Boston to learn about Lincolnshire's links to The Pilgrim Fathers, visiting the Guildhall. The children got a first-hand look at the courtroom and cells where the original Pilgrims were charged and imprisoned for trying to leave the country without the King's permission. We also spent time at the Boston Stump learning about Reverend John Cotton, previous vicar of the Stump, who became one of the founding fathers in Boston, Massachusetts.





From the 15th to 26th May all the children took part in a Whole School Fundraising challenge along with our Academy Trust schools and leaders. 
