A Peaceful Resting Place for Loved Ones

The Parish Council are pleased to announce the availability of our dedicated ashes scattering area, a serene option for laying your loved ones to rest within our community. At Ruskington Parish Council, we understand the importance of providing choices during this sensitive time.

Before scattering ashes, please note that we kindly request you to seek prior approval from the Council. However, there's no legal obligation for the Council to maintain records of your loved one or the individuals requesting the scattering of ashes. Rest assured, there is no charge for using this facility.

Should you wish to add a personal touch, we invite you to provide us with a memorial brass plaque not exceeding 10cm x 12cm. This plaque can include up to three lines of text, commemorating the date of your loved one's passing or the date of ash scattering. Upon approval from Ruskington Parish Council, we will ensure the plaque is securely affixed to the memorial wall on your behalf.

In alignment with health and safety guidelines and as a mark of respect, we have established certain regulations for the ashes scattering area, following advice from the Institute of Cemetery and Crematoria Management (ICCM):

- Ashes should be scattered during daylight hours.
- Burial of ashes is not permitted.
- Ash scattering is allowed only when there is no snow on the ground.
- Please refrain from leaving additional tributes, mementos, or trinkets, apart from approved memorial plaques.
- Non-regulation items will be respectfully removed. Memorial plaques will be maintained for 20 years before being retired.

Your understanding and cooperation are greatly appreciated as we strive to provide a peaceful and respectful resting place for your cherished loved ones.

Ruskington Methodist Church's Warm Space for All Seasons

One year ago, the idea of opening a Warm Space at Ruskington Methodist Church was just a concept. Questions loomed about its viability, the willingness of guests to attend, funding sources, and volunteer availability. Fast forward to today, and we have not only answered those questions but also saw the positive impact of our initiative.

With 15 to 20 guests each week, it's clear that this endeavour was the right thing to do. We are committed to embodying the spirit of Christ by offering warmth, love, and light to a world where people often grapple with isolation, hunger, and cold. Initially intended for the winter months, our guests' feedback inspired us to become 'Warm Spaces for All Seasons,' collaborating with other village churches.

The term 'warm' not only refers to the physical heat we provide but also to the guaranteed, non-judgmental welcome extended throughout the year. In August, responding to guest and volunteer input, we even added two extra afternoon sessions, where tea, coffee, and cake flowed freely.

Funding our project was made possible through a variety of generous means. Lincolnshire Methodist District provided an initial grant, and unsolicited monetary donations, homemade blankets, and soup poured in from church members. Friends from the Sleaford Methodist Circuit knitted blankets and contributed magazines and

newspapers. Local businesses supported us through advertising, donations of essential supplies and money. Our guests also kindly brought various items to share.

Volunteers, some not affiliated with the church, have been instrumental in our success. They received training, offered valuable feedback, and supported each other, playing various roles from cooking and serving to welcoming, playing games, and engaging with guests. One volunteer, unable to attend sessions, consistently bakes delightful cakes and puddings.

Our Warm Space evolved over the year, forming a partnership with Voluntary Centre Services that brings added activities for our guests. Looking ahead, we plan to diversify our offerings, introduce 'Wvvvarm Space Plus' with skills sharing and talks, and take part in the Sleaford Christmas Tree Festival. We're also excited about a new Wellbeing Hub in collaboration with other village churches.

Every Friday in term time, from 11am to 3pm, we open our doors. Come for a chat, enjoy quiet moments, play games, savour soup and cake, and take home a cosy blanket. If you're inclined, consider volunteering. Our mission is to ensure that no one feels isolated, hungry, or cold.

RIPARIAN OWNERSHIP


Have you ever wondered about riparian ownership in England? Well, let's dive into it!

In England, riparian ownership refers to the rights and responsibilities of landowners along a river or watercourse, including ditches and dykes that border your property. These owners enjoy certain privileges, such as the right to access and use the water, as well as the ability to fish or boat, within reasonable limits.

However, it's important to note that riparian owners also have responsibilities. If a watercourse forms the boundary between you and your neighbour, the law presumes that you own to the centre point of the watercourse.

This means that you and your neighbour are responsible for the maintenance and water flow within the watercourse. You must ensure your activities don't cause harm to the watercourse or infringe upon others' rights downstream. Preservation and proper management of the water environment are key!

If you're lucky enough to own riparian land, remember to respect and protect this valuable natural



resource. Let's work together to maintain the beauty and health of our rivers and waterways for generations to come!

The summer term may seem like a distant memory nevertheless we would like to share and celebrate some of the wonderful activities and achievements we finished the school year with.

Reception Oak class had a wonderful, busy time at Rand Farm Park for their class trip. The children enjoyed finding out facts about the animals and their young, they learnt all about how to milk a cow and what the milk is used for, bottle fed the baby goats and held chicks. They loved their ride on a modern-day tractor and saw lots of different types of tractors around the farm. Before the visit in school, the children learnt about the history of farming vehicles. Whilst on the visit they even had time to explore the play park! Jumping on the bouncy pillows, being brave on the very tall slides and sledging down the ramps!

Earlier in the term Oak class observed the butterfly life cycle. They watched the caterpillars grow and grow and then turn into a chrysalis all four of the caterpillars changed to become



butterflies which were all released in our tactile garden.

The children from Year 3 Elder class had an amazing time visiting Creswell Crags. Here they were able to consolidate their learning on the Stone Age period. The children had the opportunity to explore the Mother Grundy cave, build shelters like cave people would have done as well as having a go at being Palaeontologists. This really was a hands-on experience for the children and one that also allowed them to create wonderful recounts back in school. The staff at Creswell were superb and complimented the children on their wealth of knowledge. Just seeing how immersed the children were and how well they could answer the guestions linked to their learning was such a satisfying experience for us all.

We were pleased to take a selection of children who have strong connections to the armed forces to the Sleaford Flag Raising Ceremony to start Armed Forces Week, as always the children



were a credit to school and all forces families.



It was a pleasure to welcome Councillor Mike Clarke and Clare Clayton from the NKDC Partnership Team to our celebration worship, all of the children entered a competition to design artwork for the Veterans' Lunch Programme. Amelia won in the Key Stage 1 category; all of the children who entered were recognised with certificates.

Congratulations to Susan who has been awarded a Rotary Star for citizenship. Lissie from the Rotary Club came to school to present Susan with her certificate and badge and we were pleased to have her mum at the assembly. Susan comes cheerfully into school each morning and constantly demonstrates our school values. Susan is the most amazing role model for her peers and has wonderful kindness and compassion. Susan is able to empathise with others, showing that she thinks about how others are feeling and when appropriate, will put the needs of others before her own which is

incredible for someone her age. She has the most wonderful manners and everything she does she does because she is kind, helpful and friendly and never expects any reward for her outstanding behaviour and attitude. She always lights up our school with her joyful smile and delightful sense of humour.
